


Hooks

Some waters have restrictions on the use of certain hook types. Check the Ontario Recreational Fishing Regulations Summary before heading out.

Terminology



Common hook types



Treble Have multiple pointed

hooks on a common shaft. It is often used on manufactured lures such as crankbaits, and spoons.



Circle Great for catch and release fishing. The angled point prevents hooking soft tissue in the mouth and hooks the hard tissue of the jaw.



Bait holder Have barbs on the shank to help hold live bait to the hook.



Barbless Ideal for catch and release fishing. This hook can be removed easily so the fish can be released faster.



Wide gap worm hook Have a wide gap to hold soft bait or plastics with space to pierce the mouth with the soft bait still attached.



The weighted head causes the hook to mimic the movement of a variety of prey as it moves through the water.

Hook sizes There are two categories of hook sizes:

32 to 1 1/0 to 19/0 The larger the number, the smaller the hook. The larger the number, the larger the hook. Common hook sizes, shown at actual size. 2/0 3/0 4/0
